## Assistance Animal (Emotional Support Animal, ESA) Documentation Information Form

An Assistance Animal (ESA) is one that is necessary to afford the person with a disability an equal opportunity to use and enjoy OSU housing. An Assistance Animal (ESA) may provide physical assistance, emotional support, calming, stability and other kinds of assistance. Assistance Animals (ESA) do not perform work or tasks that would qualify them as "service animals" under the Americans with Disabilities Act. Assistance Animals (ESA) may still be permitted, in certain circumstances, in University Housing pursuant to the Fair Housing Act.

Assistance Animals (ESA's) are allowed in the immediate dwelling (residence hall room and common area) on the floor and wing the student is assigned to. Assistance Animals (ESA's) are not allowed in the dining halls, classrooms, library or other areas of the campus.

Residents whom Disability Access Services (DAS) approves for an Assistance Animal (ESA) in their on-campus residence must comply with their University Housing and Dining (UHDS) Contract and <u>OSU Service and Assistance Animal Policy</u> (http://oregonstate.edu/accessibility/serviceanimalpolicy).

**Purpose:** This questionnaire is designed to provide DAS with information to evaluate an accommodation request to bring an Assistance Animal (ESA) into UHDS. The attached form must be completed by the student's psychiatrist, psychologist, licensed social worker, or relevantly trained M.D. or mental health provider. The provider may, as an alternative, write a letter or report that addresses all questions included in this form.

**Interactive Accommodation Process:** The legal definition of a disability includes two elements: (1) a physical or mental impairment which (2) substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the person in question. Thus, disability has both diagnostic and functional elements, and **BOTH elements need to be documented for effective determination**.

# Emotional distress resulting from having to give up an animal because of a "no pets" policy does not qualify a person for an accommodation under federal law.

When an Assistance Animal (ESA) is approved for the living environment, that animal must reside in the students' room while the student is attending classes, visiting the dining halls, at the library, etc.

What would the impact(s) be, in terms of disability symptoms, that may result if the Assistance Animal (ESA) is <u>not</u> allowed?

9. Is there a different/another accommodation that could be provided in the living environment to meet this student's needs? If so, please describe below.

10. Have you discussed the responsibilities associated with properly caring for an animal while engaged in typical college activities and residing in University housing? Do you believe those responsibilities might exacerbate the student's symptoms in any way? (and if so, how)? Note: When an Assistance Animal (ESA) is approved in University housing, the student will be expected to be able to care, control, feed and clean up after the animal.

11. Is the Assistance Animal (ESA) necessary in order for the above named student to have the same opportunity that a student without a disability has to use and enjoy the residence?
